

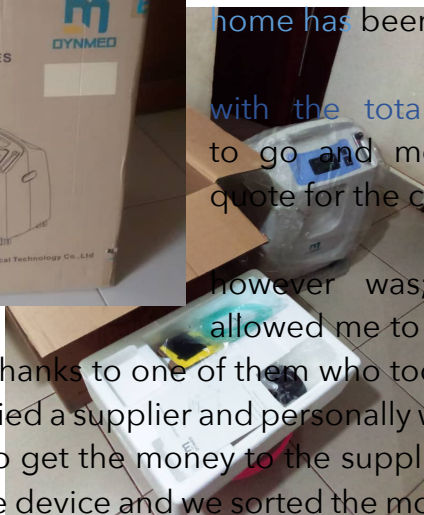
Nakanjako's OXYGEN CONCENTRATOR closure story

On behalf of the family of Margret and on my own behalf, I would bring our drive | campaign to a closure with a big thank you to all of you who came alongside me to help me help Nakanjako.

What a journey it has been! We raised the money very fast but settling her back home has been a long haul!

The challenges started with the total lockdown, which meant I was not even able to go and meet the gentleman who gave us the initial quote for the concentrator.

The blessing in disguise however was; waiting for the lockdown to ease up allowed me to consult some really compassionate and informed doctors. Thanks to one of them who took it on, she did the shopping round at several places, identified a supplier and personally went there to pick it. At the time of purchase, I struggled to get the money to the suppliers account, thanks to her kindness and trust, she paid for the device and we sorted the mobile money transfer later. She was also gracious to keep device for us until I was ready to take the patient back home



As reported in the earlier via WhatsApp chats, When the private car movements were eased up, I visited the home to assess what else needed to be fixed on the room before we take Nakanjako.



We were then hit by a huge challenge of the bathroom which needed construction from scratch to mitigate potential infections. Well, we took it on since we had made huge savings on the concentrator and built it. A friend gave an in-kind donation of floor tiles, really helpful!

When that need to was done, another hurdle was presented, the giant obstacle of a backup plan of oxygen for the patient in case power goes off was presented.

We had two options, **a)** oxygen cylinder, **b)** solar system. After weighing the costs and benefits, a solar system was preferred, but, getting a supplier and technical advice was now the challenge.

My doctor friend was still with me all this time, she helped with getting quotes and professional advice on the kind of system we needed for our specific machine. We installed the system and we were finally good to go! But I am not medically wired.

Thank God, for yet another compassionate Doctor friend who works at the hospital where Nakajako was admitted. She did all the due diligence to make sure the patient is ready to go home, in fact, we delayed the discharge for a few days when she learnt that the patient needed to treat a bout of cough.



When she was available to make the trip, she discharged the patient and together we took Nakanjako home on Tuesday 11th of August 2020.

Thank God all the huddles were jumped, Nakanjako can now live happily with her family. We pray that the Lord will complete the healing.
